Being Vigilant

Dear, Sisters and Brothers in Christ, with great joy and anticipation I greet you all in the hope that we have in our resurrected Lord Jesus Christ. Though we had a silent and virtual Easter services, Christ's resurrection reminds us of Hope of a new future.

Ordinary life is disturbed, sometimes nature itself makes the events more terrible — disease can easily accompany floods, hunger is inevitably aggravated by drought. Today, the crisis like Covid-19 pandemic is a tremendous challenge for the Church, for all people worldwide, and for our common homes, yet it *provides an opportunity to ponder on Christian faith and our response to life*.

When we closely look at St. Matthew 24:1-51, it is possible that the events spoken of in this chapter describe the turbulent years which led to the collapse of Jerusalem in AD 70 after a terrible siege. The words of Jesus in passage do not deny the reality of such events, nor give us any reason to suppose that they will not occur. Our Lord's words call up images of crises that humanity had faced in every generation — the crises of war, of famine of natural disaster. Disasters of this sort always raise questions for faith — why do such things happen in a world watched over by a loving God? These verses highlight that disaster is never the last word — it is not final. Even in the worst disasters, it is our faith in Christ that enables us to experience His divine presence and provision, helping us to hold on and to survive.

Morevoer, we should always remember that none of us can accurately predict our own future or the future of the world we live in; neither does our Lord offer us any encouragement to do so. Christian faith is not characterised by fatalism, but by an open attitude to the future, being aware that we may be taken by surprise and above all holding on to faith that whatever happens God is with us and His word will endure to the end (vs. 35).

Finally, in verses 42-44 Jesus exhorts us to *remain vigilant*. The reason for vigilance is twofold — firstly, we do not know when disaster may strike our lives, neither do we know the hour of Christ's coming. In other words, we have *to be prepared for whatever comes*. This is a warning against spiritual idleness that finds us unprepared when a crises comes, demanding of us all the strength and resources we can gather. It is also a warning against that spiritual indifference which fails to recognise the hand of God at work in our lives (1 Peter 5:6).

In this time of uncertainty, we need to stand for what is certain. Jesus is alive; He has conquered death, hell and the grave, for all eternity. In Him we have the victory of life and death.

Let us pray for those living through a time of crisis because of the Covid-19 pandemic; and for the Church, that it may be open to God's impending grace.

Importantly, what we need to think about is what we have learnt from the past Lenten seasons and how best we are preparing to receive the power of resurrection in this Lenten season.

We might have witnessed many Lenten seasons in our lives being observed in a traditional manner. But this season of Lent will be a unique one in our lives, one which will transform us completely and help us **renew our Faith in God.**

We know about how Jesus Christ fasted for 40 days and nights before He started His ministry. He spent time with God and strengthened Himself before the great task which was ahead of Him. Likewise, this Lenten season, it is very important to renew ourselves in faith, which will help us to fight against the hegemonic structures and mighty powers in this dark world and especially helps us in the fight against the present Covid-19, the deadliest virus which is taking many lives.

Ephesians 6:12

For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms.

Therefore, the most important way to renew our faith is to seek God. He will guide us, protect us, and renew us. This requires building a personal relationship with Him. It requires finding time to seek Him in every situation and moment and, also





in every crisis. Knowing that God always has us in mind, reminds us that we are not alone. Seeking God reminds us that our battles are not ours to fight, that He will fight them for us, and He will always win.

Reconciliation with our God through Jesus Reconciliation, in Christian theology, is an element of salvation that refers to the results of atonement. Reconciliation is truly a wonderful end of the estrangement, caused by the original sin, between God and humanity. John Calvin describes reconciliation as the peace between humanity and God that results from the expiation of religious sin and the propitiation of God's wrath.

The whole message of reconciliation is centered around the love of God and the death of Christ. Paul reminds us that "God demonstrates His own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). This brings peace with God, access to God through Christ, rejoicing in the hope of the glory of God, making us rejoice in suffering, and having the love of God poured out in our hearts through the Holy Spirit (Romans 5:1-5). We rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation (Romans 5:11).

Restoration of the Joy of SalvationWith the pressures of life and the sins we commit,

we can lose the joy of our salvation and become dry. God wants to restore us to full and complete joy in Him through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The Psalmist David in writing Psalm 51 recognises this fact. This Psalm is one of repentance after being confronted about his sin with Bathsheba. He is experiencing the pain of knowing he has broken the heart of God and the hearts of many people.

The joy of our salvation comes from the relief of the pain we feel when we know that God has forgiven us of our sins. Even C S Lewis says, "We would not recognise joy, if we have never experienced pain." That is why when people first get saved, they experience great joy — that they have been relieved of the pain of conviction concerning their sin.

In the present context, wherein we are witnessing the pandemic Covid-19 and being restricted to our homes, this Lenten season is a wonderful time for us to be in fellowship with the Lord, to renew our faith, to meditate on the word of God for reconciliation and to intercede for ourselves and the Universe at large for restoration of the joy of salvation.

I sincerely pray that the good Lord protects us under His mighty hand and helps us to experience the pass over of this pandemic virus.

Missing Easter

Easter 2020 has been unlike any other, with the national and global lockdowns in place. The month-long Easter choir practices, the Sunrise and various Easter service, the celebrations, the fellowship in Church and, even perhaps, the breaking of the fast, post the lent period— will certainly be missed this year!

Interestingly, there was someone in the Bible who missed—not the Easter service as we know it, but he was not present for what we could consider the first Easter, when Jesus appeared to His disciples. John 20:19-29 tells the story of Christ's disciple, Thomas, also referred to commonly as 'doubting Thomas', who wasn't present when Jesus appeared to the disciples and who did not experience what they experienced.

This was after Jesus' crucifixion, when the disciples, had locked themselves in a room, fearful that the Jewish leaders, who had crucified Jesus, would soon be looking for them, too. Then suddenly, Jesus appeared before them. "Jesus came and stood in their midst..." (John 20:19-29).

The disciples' experiences of Christ's appearances encompass the following:

- ❖ Jesus says, "Peace be with you..." (John 20: 19-21). An encounter with Christ gives us peace—the peace that comes only from a relationship with Him. The disciples were worried, confused, afraid and upset. However, the presence of Jesus brought them peace. John goes on to say, "Jesus showed them His hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord." (John 20:19-20).
- Christ gives us purpose in life. Jesus says, "as the Father has sent Me, I also send you (John 20:21). Jesus says, "Father, the hour has come.
- ❖ Glorify your Son, that your Son may glorify you." (John 17:1). Jesus abided by His Father's will to glorify the Father, even unto His death on the cross and His Resurrection, thereafter. Subsequently, He had an assignment for His followers. He commissioned them to go and be

His representatives in the world. He gave them a purpose and a commission, and this group then went out to share the good news with the world.

❖ Further, "Jesus then breathed on them and said, 'Receive the Holy Spirit." (John 20: 22-23). By this powerful act, Christ provided the strength and **power** they needed to fulfill His commission and task. He provided them with such power that they were able to preach and teach about the forgiveness of sins and salvation through Christ.

Belief in the Resurrection is essential for a true encounter with Christ. Thomas uses strong language when he says in verse 24, "Unless I see...and put my finger...I will not believe." He was so certain of Christ's death that he would not believe the disciple's report and was unwilling to accept that Christ has risen, unless certain conditions were fulfilled.

Later, Jesus met Thomas and challenged his unbelief and provided the proof that Thomas longed for. When Thomas realised that Christ had really risen from the dead he proclaimed, "My Lord and my God." (John 20: 28)

This implies that Thomas had forgotten the words of the prophets in the Old Testament. He had forgotten the teachings of Christ Himself, ignored the experience of others and refused to believe. We, too, often ignore all the signs today and disbelieve what the Bible so clearly teaches.

The important message is that Christ is to be experienced through faith. We know Him, experience Him and follow Him with faith. And Jesus says, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

We too have been locked up with fear, anxiety, and confusion — apprehensive of the COVID-19 pandemic, — like what the disciples experienced when they were locked up after Jesus' crucifixion. The disciples were radically and eternally changed as a result of their encounter with Christ—Jesus'





resurrection. Miraculously, they were transformed from fear to courage, from sorrow to joy and from hopelessness to purpose.

Let us not miss this opportunity to believe in Christ with deep faith. God will meet us right where we are and change our lives! We are assured that our encounter with the risen Lord will give us the **peace** and the **will** to share His gospel even in these trying times, thus fully utilising the **power**, through His Spirit, to overcome any challenge or circumstance we may face.

We could have been at Church — doing all the Easter-linked activities and we would have still missed Easter by missing the personal experience with the risen Christ in Church. Let us not miss the true spirit of Easter, which is the reality of the Resurrection, the life-filling power of the empty tomb and the risen Christ who stands ready to bring new life to our hearts.

The Constitution and Regulations of the Diocese of Medak

(Church of South India)

PART TWO - REGULATIONS

Chapter IX

D. CHURCH ROLL

Church Roll is a record of all the members of the local congregation. The Presbyter-in-charge of the Pastorate shall be responsible for compiling and maintaining the official Church Roll.

- To be included in the Church Roll, the member shall be an Adult Communicant Member of the C.S.I in accordance with the Constitution of the C.S.I.
- No member may have his/her name in more than one Church Roll or exercise his/her vote in more than one Local Congregation
- A Transfer Certificate or satisfactory commendation from his previous Minister-in-charge must be received by the Presbyter-in-charge, before a person, newly arrived in a Pastorate may be enrolled.
- The Church Roll should be revised and finalised by the Presbyter-in-charge as on 31st December each year and should be read in the Local Church Meeting concerned.
- In matters affecting the Church Roll, the decision of the Presbyter-in-charge, in consultation with the Local Church Committee shall be regarded as final.
- Any appeal regarding the Church Roll must be made to the Bishop within ten days of the reading of the Church Roll in the Local Church Meeting. The decision of the Bishop in the Diocese shall be final and absolute.

E. ELECTORAL ROLL

Electoral Roll is the list of members qualified to participate in the Government of the Church and entitled to take part in the Election.

- Only such persons, whose names, before the time of the Election, are recorded in the Church Roll of a Local Congregation as Adult Communicant Members, can be included in the Electoral Roll.
- In order to qualify for the privilege of participating in the *Government of the Church*, a member must fulfil the following conditions:
 - (a) He/She must be an Adult Communicant Member, with continuous membership of the CSI for at least 12 months, immediately before the preparation of the Electoral Roll.
 - (b) He/She must accept and abide by the Rules, Customs and Discipline of the C.S.I as applied in the Diocese.
 - (c) He/She must be of good Christian experience and character, held in respect by the Local Congregation and Community, and faithful and exemplary in the discharge of his duties to the Church.
 - (d) He/She must contribute to the funds of the Church. (This is interpreted only in terms of a person's own conscience.)





- (e) He/She must evidence his interest in the work of the Local Congregation by participation in Public Worship and Holy Communion and support his/her witness by his/her character, influence and service.
- (f) He must be actively engaged in the service of the Church and hold a position of responsibility in some branch of Church activity. (e.g. Stewards, Sunday School Workers, Youth Workers, Area Leaders, Women's Work Officials, Sisters of the C.S.I, Honorary Organists, Choir Masters, Hospital Visitors, members of Evangelistic and Prayer Bands etc.).
- (g) Persons owing rent or any other moneys to the Church cannot be regarded as entitled to share in the Government of the Church.
- (h) A member holding a position of responsibility in the Church and refusing to give a faithful account of his Stewardship, which is expected of him and he who declines to hand over, when demanded by the Competent Authority, the moneys, the accounts, the files, documents etc. of the Pastorate which were in his custody while holding office, shall render himself ineligible to participate in the Government of the Church.
- (i) A member who approaches the Civil Courts in matters relating to a Pastorate, the Diocese and/or against those in pastoral charges of a Pastorate, without the prior consent and written permission of the Bishop in the Diocese shall render himself ineligible to participate in the Government of the Church.
- The Presbyter-in-charge shall be responsible for the preparation and publication of the Electoral Roll, with the assistance of the Local Church Committee. The case of every member shall be reviewed most carefully, and a decision taken as to whether the member is eligible to be regarded as qualified to be on the Electoral Roll.
- The Electoral Roll, after it has been finalised by the Presbyter-in-charge, shall be published by the Presbyter-in-charge by affixing one copy of the Roll on the Notice Board of the Local Church concerned, at least 30 days before the date of the Election and an announcement shall be made at Public Worship of the congregation, at least on two successive Sundays preceding the Election.
- Any claim or objection concerning the Electoral Roll shall be made in writing, to the Presbyter-incharge, specifying the reasons for the claim or objection, within ten days of publication on the Church Notice Board.
- The Presbyter-in-charge shall forward such complaints to the Bishop as soon as possible, who shall appoint an Election Commission consisting of two or more persons, who are not members of the Pastorate concerned, to enquire into the complaints and make their recommendations to the Bishop. The decision of the Bishop shall be final, and it shall be communicated to the Presbyter-in-charge for necessary action.

The Passion of the Christ

The Passion of the Christ is arguably the most renowned biblical film in recent times. It portrays the period of the Passion of Jesus in a vastly lurid way. Mel Gibson, who directed, produced and cowrote the film, had a Traditionalist Catholic upbringing and has always been unreserved while talking about his religious beliefs. This film is a prime demonstration of his belief, which can be witnessed in the form of the prolonged gruesome scenes. The dramaturgy works on multiple levels—demonstrating the physical or bodily torture Jesus went through in the final 12 hours of His life and manifesting the spiritual or mental torment.

The screenwriters based the events in the film, mainly on the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, but also took inspiration from 'The Dolorous Passion of Our Lord Jesus' by Anne Catherine Emmerich. Throughout the film, Gibson uses his artistic license to remodel and refine some of the happenings stated in the texts, either because of the limitations of filmmaking or to make it more appealing cinematically, which the opening scene is the foremost example. The scene plays out in accordance to the event of the agony in the Garden of Gethsemane in the gospels; Jesus feels sadness and anguish while the three disciples, Peter, John and James, are asleep. As mentioned in Luke 22:44 "And being in anguish, He prayed more earnestly, and His sweat was like drops of blood falling to the

ground", droplets of blood form distinctly on Jesus' face when he cries out to the Lord in the film – "In You I take refuge". Following this, the gospels say that an angel appears and comforts Him, but Gibson decides to take a contrasting route.

In the film, Satan along with a serpent appears to Jesus, and He crushes the serpent's head. This is a reference to protevangelium, the first sign of the good news of salvation in the Bible. Protevangelium refers to Genesis 3:15, where God talks about crushing the head of the Serpent in the Garden of Eden. This alternative path that Gibson takes is representative of how the entire film turns out to be and, in this way, he tries to proclaim a consequential message in the concise form of a film.

He stated, "This is a movie about love, hope, faith and forgiveness. Jesus died for all mankind, suffered for all of us. It's time to get back to that basic message. The world has gone nuts. We could all use a little more love, faith, hope and forgiveness." The Passion of the Christ is a stark reminder of just that. With its graphic depiction of the excruciating pain and agony that our Lord went through, the movie leaves a Christian deeply moved feeling remorseful, penitent and repentant.

It could be wrong/unforgiving attitudes, biases, prejudices, hatred, bitterness, strife, people-pleasing, hypocrisy, and several other such human tendencies. This may be different for each one of us and only the Lord knows what this is.

Our Lord is not concerned about external things but values our internal life that pertains to our heart, mind, spirit and soul. He cannot be content with what we are and allow us to remain the same. Because "the love of Christ compels us, because we are convinced that one died for all, and therefore all died. And He died for all, that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for Him who died for them and was raised again" (2 Corinthians 5:14-15). I have determined to give up what He wants me to because, like Paul, I believe "So we make it our goal to please Him, whether we are at home in the body or away from it". (2 Corinthians 5:9) Amen!

(Ephesians 1: 19-20). Paul uses the Greek word for power *Dunamis*, which is the root of the word dynamite. So, Paul says that God wants to give us 'dynamite' power that can change our lives. Yes, the same power that raised Jesus Christ from the dead, is available to us now, transferring the weakness in our lives into strength.

Let us examine the three aspects of this wonderful power that can be unleashed in our lives:

1. The power to have our sins forgiven

slaves to sin. However, through His death and Resurrection, Christ frees us from the power of sin. "He was delivered over to death for our sins and was raised to life for our justification." (Romans 4:25). When Jesus died, God laid all our iniquity on Him—the punishment that all of us deserve for our sins. The Resurrection shows, undoubtedly, that Jesus sacrificed all that is necessary to pay the penalty for our sins. When Satan accuses us by saying "Think how terrible you are. God could never forgive you for what you have done." Remember, we can say "Jesus rose from the dead for me and I believe in Jesus. So, I am righteous in God's eyes." Unravelling the Resurrection

When God created man and woman and placed them in the Garden of Eden, death was not on the cards nor was ageing, nor pain, nor suffering. Then, when our first parents sinned, they inherited death and ageing and everything that goes with these. When God warned Adam and Eve, "The day you eat the fruit of the Tree of Knowledge, you shall surely die." (Genesis 2:17) they did not understand the impact of what this meant completely. Death itself was a new experience for them. This was a separation from God with a provision for reconciliation with Him, while they were still alive. There is another death described as the second death (Revelation 2:11/20:6). This death results in irreconcilable separation from God. Adam and Eve inherited this 'death', too. People are afraid of death mainly because of the unknown factor, which is beyond death. God's plan of Salvation was to free all people from the fear and power of this 'second death'.

When they lost the pristine state of deathlessness, people began to yearn for longevity and eternity and since then, they have been fantasising about the possibility of life after death. The Sumerian, Persian, Egyptian, Greek, Roman cultures in the West and the Indian and Chinese cultures in the East began to translate their dreams and wishful thinking about life after death into, myths, fables and fairy tales about gods and goddesses coming back to life after their death — in a battle, or due to a curse, or by gods raising the dead. Thus, Eternity became a dream and remained a dream.

The Bible is the only book that promises Eternity and we should be concerned with this (Ecclesiastes 3:10-11). The Jewish culture believed in Eternity and since death was inevitable and Eternity was God's gift to His people, there had to be a link between death and eternity and that was and is the Resurrection.

When Jesus claimed He came from God (John 12:34) implying He was the Messiah and that He would be lifted up (meaning his death by crucifixion) the Jews were confused. How could the Messiah die? They missed the vital link of the Resurrection, that is the link between the Messiah's death and Him being eternal.

Jesus proved this by His Resurrection. He was indeed the first person in the history of the human race who died and rose again, thus putting an end to all myths, fables and fairy tales. We are convinced that Jesus rose again from the dead—both from the bodily death and the 'second death'. The Bible says, "The wages of sin is death." (Romans.6:23). If we think this death (cessation of physical life) is the result of our sins, then we are getting off lightly. This 'other death' is much serious and dangerous. It is a living death in Hell. Once a soul enters Hell, Death will not let it out. It is locked-in, permanently!

When we say Jesus paid the penalty for our sins, we are using the term lightly. He paid the ultimate penalty— the 'wage' of sin. He entered Hell committing His soul into the Father's hands. Indeed, these were His last words on the Cross. He made this dangerous entry and death would not let him out. So, He broke the gates of Hell fulfilling the prophecy (Psalm.16:10). Peter quotes this Psalm in his address on the first Pentecost Day, saying that it was not possible that He should be held by Sheol (Acts 2:24 and 27). Thus, Jesus paid the penalty of the sins of all people fully. This is the victory we commemorate and celebrate on the day of Resurrection. "Because I live, you will also live." (John.14:19) ... "never to die again." (John.11:26). Jesus' Resurrection gives us the blessed hope of Eternity.

Jesus' Resurrection transformed the disciples—from cowards into warriors, daring and facing





death, from orthodox Jews, into loving, liberal Christians, discarding ritualism and favouring inclusive community living.

So, what does this celebration mean to us at St. John the Baptist Church, Hyderabad? What changes have you undergone by the power of Jesus' Resurrection? And, importantly, what are your thoughts on Eternity?

"It is precisely because of Eternity that everything on earth gains importance, meaning and value. Christianity stresses on the fact that all that we do here on earth is in right relationship with what we are in Eternity. Eternal life is the sole sanction for the values of this life." (Dorothy L. Crucifixion of Jesus Christ - His Death

The crucifixion of Jesus Christ and His resurrection are the two most important events in human history. Why is this so? Because of Jesus' death, the human race has the opportunity for eternal salvation. All four of the New Testament Gospels talk of the crucifixion of Christ. Here are some main points in the crucifixion timeline:

- Jesus was arrested in the Garden of Gethsemane (Mark 14:43-52).
- Jesus endured six trials three by Jewish leaders and three by the Romans (John 18:12-14, Mark 14:53-65, Mark 15:1a, Mark 15: 1b-5, Luke 23:6-12, Mark 15:6-15). Jesus survived painful beating, whipping, and mocking (Mark 15:16-20).
- Pilate tried to compromise with the religious leaders by having Jesus beaten, but this act didn't satisfy them. Pilate handed Jesus over to be crucified (Mark 15:6-15).
- Jesus was mocked by the soldiers as they dressed Him in a purple robe and a crown of thorns (John 19:1-3).
- Jesus was crucified on Golgotha, which means the Place of the Skull (Mark 15:22). The sky turned dark for three hours (Mark 15:33).
- Jesus cried, "Father! Into your hands I commit my spirit!" and He died (Luke 23:46).

Repairs done to Church of St John the Baptist, Secunderabad

(1997 - 1999 and 2000 - 2001)

This is a vivid and detailed first-hand account of the renovations and repairs carried out on Church of St. John the Baptist, Secunderabad by Mr IPP Prabhakar Rao, Mr Y S Purushotham and team over 20 years ago at the behest of the Pastorate Committee, at that time. It was indeed a formidable task, but the team's meticulous eye for detail and quest for perfection made it possible.

Mr Prabhakar Rao was specifically requested to submit a fresh report on all the work undertaken at that time. This makes very interesting reading and will also be of invaluable help to anyone undertaking repairs on the Church in future.

I call this report Deuteronomic for two reasons:

- 1. I had already written a report by hand in 1999, but all those pages seem to have become termite eaten. I am, therefore, writing this again with the caveat that since it is reproduced from memory, it is prone to have a few errors.
- 2. Unlike Moses, when he presented the Deuteronomy, I am still in the plains of Jordan, ready to cross the river into the Promised and hoped-for land at our Lord's behest.

At my age, I am not able to get up to the roof to convince the doubters to the nature of work done, so like Peter, before I put aside my tabernacle (2 Peter 1:14) I wish to record what I remember, as a reference for an effective follow-up when any repairs become necessary in future. The only other person who knew about the technical details of those repairs, was my brother in-law Mr Y S Purushotham, who has already gone on ahead of me to be with the Lord.

In May 1997, during a wedding when it rained heavily my brother-in-law and I observed heavy leakages from the roof of the church. The next Sunday it was announced that the church needed help to get the roof repaired. After the church service, a few members, who were engineers, met up at the parsonage. (At that time, Rev B Joseph was the Presbyter-in-charge). Several members offered to help 'when they were needed', but all of them were gainfully employed, so were not available to help on a day-to-day basis.

It appeared that some attempts had been made earlier to stop the leakages, but these attempts were casual and not taken up after a detailed study of the problem.

We commenced work on the roof repairs in all earnestness in the first week of June 1997. Mr Y S Purushotham and I got up on the roof using ladders and this soon became a daily routine for both of us. It was observed that no single access to the entire roof was available. There was one direct access, a ladder from the parsonage end, but this covered only one quarter of the roof. We installed another ladder on the northwest area, but we needed four accesses to cover the entire area. This led us to procure two more ladders, fabricated in steel. The one on the southwest side was fixed to the wall and the northeast one was fixed to a masonry pillar, which was constructed like a pedestal. All these three ladders were made half the height from the top, to discourage miscreants from getting on to the roof. The lower half, that is, from the ground to the steel ladder, was to be negotiated using a removable bamboo ladder. We also cut the parapet wall on the top to a height of two feet, to enable easy access to the roof. Handles were fixed for





support for climbing up and down from the roof back to the ladder. When we finally got on to the roof, we were able to examine the roof in detail.

There are two slopes on the entire roof. The higher one in the centre, is steeper and is covered with Mangalore tiles. The lower slope is flatter and is covered with G.C. (galvanised corrugated) sheets. These cover the aisles in the main portion of the church. Rain falls from the tiles onto the G.C. sheets, which then flows into the drain along the wall and then into the drainpipes. This is the design for the rainwater runoff.

We found:

- 1. Huge lumps of concrete dumped at the suspected areas of the leak
- 2. The rainwater outlets in the walls (2' thick) were very small and partly choked
- 3. The drain channel along the wall was ill-defined and irregular
- 4. Many of the tiles on the roof were loose and broken
- 5. Some of the G.I. sheets were loose and adrift
- 6. The ceiling timber had rotted at the edges towards the wall

With a clearer understanding of the situation, we planned to set things right, one after the other.

Mr N S J Devadattham, the Church Secretary at that time, was with us on day-to-day basis and extended his full cooperation and was also a source of tremendous encouragement. Without this, it would have been difficult for us to do the job. It is important to note that all the labour force employed for the repairs, were insured as a group to cover any untoward accidents. (We thank God there were no accidents and no claims!)

The concrete lumps placed earlier, ostensibly to arrest the leakages, were totally dug out and removed. We dug into the parapet wall and cut a larger drain into it. Some of the ceiling timbers (slats), placed for absorbing heat from the roof, were found to be rotten towards the wall end. These were cleaned up and a chemical-like paint was brushed on them, to prevent further rotting. (Regrettably, I am not able to recall the name of the chemical used at that time.). This chemical hardened, providing a glass-like protection to the timber. We also fixed thin, acrylic sheets under the ceiling timber, all round the roof, as an extra precaution. These were painted to match the colour of the rest of the timber. Over the ceiling timber, we placed G.I. corrugated (G.C.) sheets.

With a mason team headed by Shaik Mehboob and his brother-in-law Mira Vali, we constructed a drain with cement mortar 1:4, running neatly from drainpipe to drainpipe. The drain holes in the wall were widened and short pipes were placed inside them, with a downward slope, finished at both ends, seamlessly.

The standard practice in usage of cement, adopted was:

- 1. All cement work was mixed with ACCO proof waterproofing compound
- 2. The cement-sand proportion was generally 1:4, which was richer than normal mortar
- 3. All cement work was cured with a concrete chemical curing compound, obtained from the United Engineering Corporation, RP Road. (The owner, Mr Ramesh Sahani, was a former student of Mr Devadattham.)





As and when the cement work was completed, this compound was brushed over the area, when the mortar was green. This formed a plastic film on the cement and did not allow the moisture from the mortar to evaporate until the cement gained its full strength, without any watering. All the previous cement works done, did not gain full strength because of insufficient water curing, as required. (We cannot really expect sustained good curing by water for over 10 days, at that height, since it is a very laborious process and there is shortage of water in the borewell.)

The cement drains were very carefully completed, maintaining slopes to drain off the water from half the quantity of the roof runoff, towards the drain hole. The other half sloped into the next drain hole. So, each hole drained two halves from either side. Next, we created metal troughs from aluminum sheets, to serve as drains. These Al. drains were pre-formed in the shape of the cement drain, to sit squarely in the drain. However, on the wall side the Al. drain was about a foot high with a lip folded into the wall and embedded into it. The drain was about 2 feet long, on the G.C. sheets side, and this portion of the Al. drain sheet was pushed under the G.C. roofing sheets but not bolted to them. Thus, the water from the roofing sheets would drain into the Al. drain. The Al. drains were 3 feet wide and were placed with an overlapping of 2 inches, making sure the overlap was in line with the slope of the cement drain. These joints were sealed with m-seal and covered over with UV-resisting tape obtained from Shalimar Tar Products. This procedure was done all round the roof. These Al. troughs were expected to be the first defence against leak and the second line of defence was the cement-plastered drain.

Valley Repairs:

The valleys, which linked the two slopes, at differing angles presented quite a difficult problem. Originally, lead sheets were used to cover the valley, but in some, there were large gaps, covered over with pieces of plain G.I. sheets. These worked loose in gales, or got lifted up and left gaping holes, allowing rainwater to pour in. These G.I. sheet bits were removed, the lead sheets were readjusted, and the joints soldered to keep them in position. Over a few years, these leaks had damaged the wooden beams in the northeast and northwest roofs, which supported the roof below and had rotted at the ends. We, therefore, under-pinned the roof with screw jacks and had the beams removed and replaced with R.S. joists. This was done in the case of the both the valley beams in the north transept. Fortunately, the other two sides, in the case of the south transept were in good condition. So, nothing else needed to be done. However, the valleys on the roof had to be treated similarly.

Roof Tiles:

Many of the tiles on the roof were broken or had become loose. These were replaced and re-laid and the joints were cement plastered and cured with the curing compound. The roof tiles over the Quadro spheroidal altar were replaced totally and joints were plastered and cured. The rotted rafter ends were packed with m-seal and finished, to prevent further rain damage. As we completed each section of the roof, we tested this by pumping water on to the roof and, thus, all minor leaks were attended to. Therefore, when rains came in that monsoon season, there were no surprises!

The roof work was completed in April 1998 and proved to be well done. There was a Thanksgiving Service conducted by Bishop Rt Rev B P Sugandhar and Pastor B Joseph on 2 May 1998. (Those interested, may like to see the stone tablet placed at the entrance of the Church, commemorating the rededication of St John the Baptist Church.)





I would like to reiterate that there could be some mistakes in my narrative written more than 20 years later, after the job was done. Here, I also would like to express my thanks to Mr Francis Diwakar, former Chairman of St John's Educational Society and Mr Kripa Francis Physical Training Instructor, St John's High School who extended their unstinted help in providing material and manual help, whenever we asked for it. Mr. Kripa Francis also physically helped with the soldering of the lead sheets in the roof valleys.

We would like to place on record the enthusiastic and ready help provided by Philip, the sexton and his wife, Rani who went beyond the call of duty. We also thank the masons Mehboob and Mira Vali and their workers. We thank Pastor Joseph and the congregation for praying for us during this challenging endeavor.

Most importantly we thank God that the repairs were successful. We shower our grateful thanks to Him for involving us in these repairs and equipping us with all the help required constantly, over the long period of repairs and for protecting the whole team from accidents over the lengthy phase of repairs. We also are grateful for the all-round support from the congregation, which financed the whole project completely.

We need to reiterate that the drains and the spouts are to be kept free from clogging with dry leaves and mud and a pre-monsoon check every year is imperative and its importance cannot be overstated.

(Aside: We had the additional privilege of praying on the roof of the Church, while we were there, in addition to praying under the roof of the church regularly.)

Other Repairs in brief:

It is remarkable that the timbers supporting the roof beams rafters and reapers suffered only water damage and were not termite ridden. However, the timber in the addendum structures like the north vestry, adjacent to the organ room and the store room were termite eaten. (Subsequently, about four years later, we got the whole Church timber, including the woodwork for the organ comprehensively treated with termite control-pesticide.) This was done effectively by Mr David Shalem of Prudence Pest Control.

It is suggested that the termite protection treatment be done once in 5 years, regularly.

Subsequently, the Pastorate Committee approved our proposal to replace the aging lime mortar, used for the exterior, with cement mortar. This was taken up in earnest in mid-2000 and the old mortar was removed, section by section, and plastered with cement mortar 1:6. The belfry was started on first, as the mortar was peeling off.

While this was in progress, tragically, Mr Y S Purushotham passed away on Christmas day, in 2000. I carried on with the balance work and completed the work in early 2001.

Incidentally, all the measurements for the exterior were recorded by Mr Purushotham in his own handwriting and are still available in our church files.

After two years it was found that the ceiling timber over the altar was becoming loose and for good measure the whole timber was replaced, after being treated for termites and then painted white. Prior to this, the reapers supporting the tiles were given an anti-termite treatment too. All this work was done with the active help of Dr M Udaia Kumar, our Church member.

The Indian Christian Marriage Act, 1872

The Indian Christian Marriage Act of 1872 is an act of the Parliament of India regulating the legal marriage of Indian Christians. It was enacted on July 18, 1872, and applies throughout India, excluding territories such as Cochin, Manipur, Jammu, and Kashmir.

According to the act, a marriage is legitimate if at least one of the parties is Christian. An ordained minister of any church in India, a clergyman of the Church of Scotland, a marriage registrar or a special licensee may marry an aspiring couple under the act. The marriage performer issues a marriage certificate. This certificate is recorded with the Registrar of Marriage (who is appointed by the government). As is common in other Indian marriage acts, the minimum age is 21 for the groom and 18 for the bride.

The marriage ceremony must occur between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m., unless the marriage performer secures special permission. The wedding may take place in a church; however, in cases where there is no church within five miles, an appropriate alternative location may be chosen.






