I am reminded of a chorus that my grandkids learnt at the St John's Church VBS "Faith as small as a mustard seed, can move mountains". It is a short chorus, a "go-to" for any occasion at our home, catchy and easy to learn. The lyrics are straight from the Bible, Matthew 17:14-20.

As I write this article, I know of families within our Church who have gone through a tough time during COVID-19. Some have had several family members ill, some continue to be admitted in hospitals, and some have even lost their dear ones. We often need a mountain moved, our mountains being illness, financial reversal, bereavement and several other such seemingly insurmountable problems.

Paul writes, "I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well-fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want, I can do all this through Him who gives me strength." (Philippians 4:12- 13). God did not deliver Paul from all his wants, but helped him triumph in all circumstances.



In another instance, in Luke 17:11-19, the ten lepers were healed just by their obedience to Jesus' instruction of going to the priest. They only needed enough faith to be willing to obey Jesus.

The mustard seed is described as "the smallest of all

seeds" in Matthew 13:32. It seems that anybody in the audience described in Matthew 17:14-20 would have at least that much faith, or else the father of the ill child would not have been there seeking Jesus' intervention and healing for his child. However, it is one thing to believe that God can, and another to have the faith that God will give us what we need.

What we learn from the above cited instances in the Bible is that prayer must be coupled with surrendering to God's will. There are times in the Bible when God did not give what the people sought. Surely, believers were praying for Stephen's safety, yet he was stoned to death. James (the Lord's brother) was beheaded, Paul was in prison. There were indeed believers praying for them. Jesus prays, "Father, if it is possible, let this cup be taken from me." (Matthew 26:39). Yet, Jesus was later crucified. Faith must be free of doubt and must come from a heart surrendered to God's will and plan. We are to live with the faith that God will fulfil His plan in our lives and His plan is the best for us.

"Whatever God allows us to endure in this life, it will not compare to the glory He has waiting in the life to come" (Romans 8:18). Further, we know that "In all things God works for the good of those who love Him" (Romans 8:28). During these trying COVID times, we may have to face tough circumstances. How blessed are we that we can be sure that God is constantly working for our good? We are called to endure even through all things — good or bad, through faith.

Our church has been blessed during the pandemic with the opportunity of being connected with one another, praying together and worshipping together



A Congregations' Involvement in the Mission of the Church

Mission, is the mission of God carried out by His church. It is traditionally referred to as, *Missio Dei* in Latin, translated as the 'Mission of God'. It is God's mission in the world, primarily through His church. The church lives by its participation in the mission of God. Otherwise, it is only a self-serving human social organisation. The Church is supposed to be a dynamic movement for the mission.

How can the Church become a movement and channel of God's mission in the world? There is need, therefore, for the congregations' involvement in the mission of the Church, both inside and outside. There are four areas which need attention and active participation of the members of the Church. Proper organisation of these areas will result in revitalising, renewing and transforming congregational life in worship, sharing of resources and growing in witness. These four areas have been described in some detail below.

1. Worship and Music: This committee is responsible for meaningful, creative and helpful worship services of the Church. The committee will be accountable for changes in the worship services, deciding on and securing guest preachers for any special occasions or when the Pastor is not available, presenting special programmes of music and drama, or the organising of special meetings which affect the spiritual life of the congregation. People with musical talents and interest in worship could be appointed to this committee. Our Church has been too long without the real joy of worshipping in truth and spirit. All over the world, the charismatic movement is spreading and new charismatic groups are being formed. House fellowships are being built. These are meant not only for geographical convenience, but also for theological reasons. They are a kind of reaction to the neglect of its members in several large historic Churches. Our liturgical experiences should be related to everyday life situations.

I often get the impression that the leaders of worship programmes go through certain formalities, such as reading the liturgical order, carrying out routine activities, Sunday after Sunday, making lengthy announcements or written intercessions, taking part in the Holy Communion in a disorderly manner, rendering special individual songs, more for selfprojection and ego fulfilment than in real praise of God—unmindful of visitors or even of the persons sitting next to them. Unprepared reading of the lessons from the Bible, ill-prepared sermons and so on, do not add to the spirituality of worship. After attending the worship, the congregation needs to return with the full satisfaction that they worshipped God, heard the Gospel of the good news of Jesus Christ and that they truly enjoyed the fellowship of the community of the faithful.

Much depends on the leader who prepares for the worship, prayerfully and reverently, keeping in mind the genuine love of his/her people. Three or four years of full time, residential theological training is not required if the person only reads the written liturgy and does nothing creatively. All the worship leaders need to make a note of this and make the worship an eventful experience of celebrating the great work done by Jesus Christ in saving the world.

The chapter on Worship of the Church in the Constitution of the Church of South India gives enough provision for creativity and dynamism, while preparing and leading worship. The revised *Book of Common Worship* also provides ample variations/alternatives for use, according to the occasion. The Scriptures say, "Worship the Lord in the beauty of His holiness".

2. Mission and Evangelism: This is an important committee, responsible for all mission and evangelism activities of the Church. It has the responsibility for developing and promoting outreach programmes of the congregation. This committee is concerned with the service to the



neighbourhood, as well as support and interest to sustain the general mission of the church. The congregation looks to this committee for help in dealing with social issues and in keeping everyone informed about various welfare needs. The mission committee should work on action projects and find ways of funding the mission's support. Earlier, during the great Missionary days, the Gospel was seen as against cultures and religions. But now the understanding of this Mission has changed. It is no longer Christianity against other religions, but the Church in our schools and colleges to show what we believe in. St Paul says, "We are the living letters" (2 Corinthians 3:1-3).

Years ago, the late Bishop Peddi Victor Prem Sagar introduced in the Church of South India, a new concept of Mission and called it VELCOM (Vision for Equipping Local Congregations for Mission). Adequate literature is available on this vision.

The essence of this vision is as follows: The congregation meets periodically for an agape fellowship. After the fellowship, they discuss and set an agenda for the issues that they could attend to in the mission of the church. Then, they analyse and set priorities of what they can do, in a given time with the available resources. Finally, they make an action plan for implementation.

VELCOM — agape leading to agenda, agenda leading to analysis, analysis leading to action. What a wonderful vision for equipping local congregations for mission! "Woe, unto me, if I do not preach the Gospel. I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation". (1 Corinthians 9:16) These are the two most famous and popular statements of St Paul on the mission of sharing the Gospel.

3. Christian Education: The committee on Christian education has the responsibility of establishing, supervising and evaluating the Christian educational activities of the Church. Providing relevant learning experiences for all Church members and staffing the Christian education programme, is its most important task. All facets of the educational programme must be covered for all ages. This committee is responsible

for establishing the curriculum, teaching aids, materials, and supplies, as well as teaching equipment and devices. Teachers for the programme, volunteers, helpers, and resource people must be secured. Information and practical experience in instructional techniques and information about the faith and various curricular activities/areas must be provided. Christian nurture, is as important as education in the schools. It is no wonder that King Solomon always insisted on his teaching his sons (and daughters too, though this is not specifically mentioned in the Book of Proverbs) that fear, in this case, reverence of the Lord, is the beginning of wisdom. In many instances, present-day Christian children are provided with quality education, but not qualitative Christian nurture. Proper Christian education materials need to be used in the Sunday schools, or in other times like Vacation Bible schools. Good quality materials are produced by the Evangelical Fellowship of India (CEEFI), India Sunday School Union (ISSU) Coonoor and other such agencies. Some churches, like Church of South India, Church of North India and Mizo Presbyterian Church produce their own Christian education materials. Teachers, need to be trained for teaching Christian education in the Sunday schools. Teaching and leadership of the Sunday schools should not become a monopoly of some people, but of the whole church. Teach the children when they are young, so that they do not depart from it when they are adults.

- **4.** Facilities and Finances: A committee for facilities and finances is responsible for, Mission within as follows:
- a. Overseeing the Church budget
- b. Setting the pledge programme and fund-raising events
- Disbursing funds to meet financial obligations of the Church
- d. Maintaining programmes for audit and payroll or assessment allocations
- e. Inspecting and insuring the Church-owned property
- f. Detailing and supervising custodial work
- g. Maintaining and beautifying Church buildings and their surroundings



Finally, we need to discuss **Mission outside of the church**, usually call extension work. This is the work of evangelism and mission in sharing the Gospel of the good news of Jesus Christ, in caring and having concern for people in need, for sustaining the ecology and environment and many other examples of diaconal ministry. A congregation that is motivated for mission will set apart a certain percentage of its budget for this cause. Often, the responsibility for such activities is entrusted to the treasurer alone. He or she, will need the assistance of a group of people for advice and direction.


In conclusion, *Mission* is God's Mission. It is entrusted to the people of God. It is not simply an

individual affair, but of the community of believers. It is not an exclusive, but an inclusive enterprise. The church exists for Mission. Our congregations, or the Pastorate Committee need to discuss these matters in their meetings and make the Mission of God a reality for their church. This is possible only if there is a will to do it. Often, it is the Pastorate Committee that takes all decisions regarding the congregation. And, rightly so! However, decentralising the activities and decision making, will only help the church grow. What we need today, is not a muted congregation, but an active community.

"To whom much is given, much is also expected of them" (Luke 12: 48).





Are you Positive?

On pins and needles, Rachel called her husband, "Are you positive?" These days, positive and negative mean the result of the RT PCR. Even common men, women, and children have heard about RT PCR and COVID-19. As soon as she heard that he was negative, Rachel heaved a great sigh of relief and wanted to pray and thank the Lord.

The world as we know it has metamorphosed from the beginning of 2020. The announcement of a lockdown in March 2020 in our country has heralded, what we call, a 'new-normal'.

Things are not as they were. A tiny 1-micron bit of RNA twisted in a protein (that is, a virus) has blown the world apart! This tiny Corona virus has made us sit up and be conscious of it. New words have come into use. New protocols and new ways of doing things are in place.

COVID-19, which is the Coronavirus disease birthed in 2019, is more than just a viral disease. It has affected economies: the world economies, provincial and city economies. The economies of homes have also suffered greatly. So, this is an economic scourge, too. How is this disease affecting us?

This virus has affected and continues to affect many in our immediate family, larger circle, and acquaintances. Strangely, some people escape with no symptoms. Some have mild symptoms like fever, body aches, and loss of sensation of smell. And, others have respiratory, as well as other complications.

Simple medicines and home or self-quarantine seem to be enough for many, but some patients need to go to quarantine centres. A few even need hospitalisation. Some of these hospitalised, become serious and need admission into the Intensive Care Units (ICUs). Some patients need oxygen. Some are given oxygen through nasal tubes, while others need intubation. Some severe cases even need to be on ventilators. A few patients are not able to make it and they pass away. Most unfortunately, the lack of free availability of oxygen plagues some of them.

By God's grace, many are healed and are coming gratefully back to the mainstream. However, some of these again have serious post - COVID complications.

In light of this pandemic, pandemonium constantly plagues us.

As Christians, as believers in an omnipotent God, what is our response? We are all bewildered, flummoxed. Why is God, who is in control, who is a loving God, allowing this scourge to invade humankind? Is it His judgment?

Questions such as these worry us. Are there any answers? Some say God wants to teach us a lesson, and so allows us to suffer. Perhaps. What exactly is He teaching us?

Importantly, what do we do about this problem?

Pray. Yes, many of us are praying for all those affected. The result? Some people are healed, and our faith gets bolstered.

Then, some people do not get healed; they succumb to the disease, and our faith gets a shock.

Help. Please do help- May be financially, or send a



home-cooked meal to the affected family. Or, help out the affected person or family with information and practical assistance regarding hospital admissions or even procurement of oxygen.

There are two approaches we take vis-a-vis this crisis.

The first one, is to develop a fear of COVID-19. This becomes a phobia, a psychological dread. People in this category take extreme precautions and are always applying sanitisers to their hands and cell phones, they avoid people and dread to hear anything about it. They drink up all the fake news and views expressed in the "WhatsApp University". They faithfully take the vaccines and fervently follow all the protocols, with the hope that the virus will give them a wide berth and skirt all of them and their families.

In fact, in some of these people, the fear of the disease, the phobia, is making them suffer more than the virus itself. They actually need to go for counselling and psychotherapy!

On the other hand, there are those who are super spiritual, if I may be allowed to use this phrase. They say, "The Lord will protect and heal us. Why should we worry?" They also say, "Why take the vaccine? Let us trust the Lord, brothers! Why take so many precautions? Isn't God in control?"

"We must pray and ask God to protect us. He has promised to listen to our prayers and He will keep his promises. Isn't He the same yesterday, today, and forever?"

Which is the right approach? Which approach is the Bible is telling us to take?

We need to maintain a golden mean between the above two approaches. They are both extremes. We need to strike a balance, a dynamic homeostasis as it were, between the two views. This is possible if we consider that all medical knowledge is a gift of God. It is God who heals.

It is the same God who enables scientists to devise a vaccine in record time. It is the same God who is behind the brain of the physician and the loving care of the nurse or therapist.

What do we do then you ask?

Pray and ask the good Lord to protect you, your family, your family of families, your society, and the world. Be diligent in this duty of yours to pray. At the same time, take the necessary precautions and protect yourself and your family. Be mindful of the protection of others, too. Really, care for everyone. If you are eligible, take the vaccine when available, but do continue to take precautions. And, the Lord our God will protect you and provide for you!



again. So simple.


Dilly, Dally, Say yes to Jesus, Say yes to Eternity.

Empty Tomb - A Borrowed Tomb

Jesus went to Peter's home and healed his mother-in-law who was ill. Afterwards, He went to preach to the crowds who were following Him. There, a would-be follower of Jesus expressed his wish to go with Him wherever He went. Then Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes and birds of the air have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his Head" (Matthew 8:20). If we try to understand the above verse, it will open many incidents of "borrowing" in the life of Jesus.

- **1. Borrowed Womb:** God, the father, used Mary's womb to give birth to His son, Jesus. Mary, a virgin, betrothed to Joseph, found great favour in the eyes of the Father. The angel, Gabriel, who was sent by God said to Mary, "Rejoice, highly favoured one, the Lord is with you; blessed are you among women!" ... and behold, you will conceive in your womb and bring forth a Son and shall call His name Jesus" (Luke 1:28 and 31).
- 2. Borrowed Manger: Jesus was born in a borrowed manger in Bethlehem. As per the order of Caesar Augustus, for census, Joseph took Mary who was pregnant to Bethlehem in Judea from Nazareth to get themselves registered. "So, it was that while they were there, the days were completed for her to be delivered. And, she brought forth her first born Son, and wrapped Him in swaddling clothes and laid Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." (Luke 2:6-7).
- **3. Borrowed Boat:** Jesus called rugged fishermen as His disciples and used a borrowed boat to preach to the multitudes (Luke 5:3).
- **4. Borrowed Colt:** When His time for crucifixion was nearing, to enter Jerusalem, He borrowed a colt (Luke 19:30).
- **5. Borrowed an upper room to celebrate Passover:** Before His death, Jesus, wanted to institute the Lord's Supper. So, He called His disciples, Peter and John and asked them to prepare the Passover (Luke 22:10-12).
- **6. Borrowed a garden to pray:** After the Lord's Supper, Jesus came out and went to the garden of Gethsemane to pray and told His disciples also to pray, so that they may not fall into temptation (Luke 22:44).
- 7. **Borrowed a robe by the mockers:** The Roman soldiers made great fun of Jesus by gathering around Him. They borrowed a scarlet robe and put it on Him (Matthew 27:28).
- **8. Borrowed a shoulder to carry His Cross:** Jesus started His journey, carrying His cross to Golgotha, the place where He was to be crucified. The mocking soldiers, the mob, the disciples of Jesus, Mother




Mary, all His family and His followers all started walking with Jesus. Jesus was cruelly treated by the soldiers, blood started oozing from His wounds. He was tired and dehydrated and crushed under the weight of the cross. At that juncture, the soldiers borrowed another man named Simon to carry His cross for some time (Luke 23:26).

- **9. Borrowed a Tomb:** Jesus was buried in the borrowed tomb of Joseph of Arimathea (Matthew 27:58-59).
- **10. Borrowed a lie to deny His Resurrection:** When the chief priest and others came to know that Jesus was raised from the dead, they were afraid and bribed the guards at the tomb to lie that their disciples took Him away when they were asleep (Matthew 28:13).

Being the Son of Almighty God, heir of the whole world, Jesus humbled Himself to borrow the things He needed and right up to His death on the cross. While doing so, he made the Cross the everlasting symbol of redemption, which previously was a symbol of shame. His death on the cross gave the ultimate definition of humility to the world. The revelation leading to the understanding of the Holy Spirit is evident from the study of the life of King David. The Lord offered the Israelites protection with the Ark of the Covenant, which is today manifested through the Holy Spirit. King David waited several years to be crowned king and the Ark of the Covenant, considered God's dwelling place, remained out of reach to him. This was because, in his zeal to acquire the ark, King David did not strictly follow God's instructions about the handling of the ark, while it was being brought back to Jerusalem from Beth-Shemesh (1 Samuel 7:1). Uzzah put his hand out to steady the ark which resulted in his death (Numbers 4:15) because, while God's presence within the Ark of the Covenant provided blessings and victory to the Israelites over their enemies, it also demanded reverential handling.

In today's context, reverence simply means that we need to seek God's power by worshipfully inviting and enabling the Holy Spirit to help us face life's challenges. This includes a great responsibility and willingness to keep away from sin. Our voluntary action to lead holy lives enables the Holy Spirit's power to be manifested in our lives.

In today's world, our lack of reverence to God can be shown in subtle ways—like being late or irregular to church, neglecting God's word, or not praying, lack of fellowship, inadequate giving, and so on. These are a few among the myriad follies we all are aware of. The sinking feeling we experience when we transgress, clearly indicates some lack of reverence and devotion to God.

Even as the Ark of the Covenant showered blessings on Israel, so also the Holy Spirit can be a great blessing in our lives. In Acts1:8, Jesus tells His disciples, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the ends of the earth." True to His word, the Holy Spirit's power descended on the church in Jerusalem and 3000 believers were added to the church on the day of Pentecost.



Simply stated, the lack of the Holy Spirit in our lives makes us ignoramuses who cannot perceive Godly things. What a sorry state we will be in if we go through life independent of the Spirit of God! On the other hand, with God in our lives there is promise of a reward, for it is written in 1 Corinthians 2:9

What no eye has seen,
What no ear has heard
What no mind has conceived
God has planned for those who love Him.

What a great blessing therefore it is, to be in the centre of God's will and reap a whirlwind of rewards as our destiny. As CS Lewis says, "Everything that is not eternal, is worthless in eternity".

Therefore, let us focus all our energies towards gaining a rich inheritance in eternity and being blessed. Amen.




"Let the living waters flow over my soul,

The service proceeds. It is also live streamed for those watching from home. This is the norm now. Technology came to the rescue and changed the world. We listen and pray, masks on. The sanctuary gets warm – no air-conditioning, no windows, and no fans. I recall with longing the fans at St John's going full speed, the wide-open windows wafting in cool breezes. Thanks to a dear friend who sends me the link for St John's Sunday services, I have watched nostalgically the cool interior of my Secunderabad church, as the cross-bearer stands ready at the main entrance. Everyone is properly masked and socially distanced. (I recognise some familiar faces!) Every other pew is cordoned. Just like here. We are all one under our Lord, following His guidance to keep the laws of the land (Mark 12:17).

Back here in our Vancouver church, we too sit socially distanced, wearing our masks. Outside, it is thirty degrees Celsius. Much better than forty-plus degrees. Flowers are blooming, a gentle wind wafts up. I praise the Lord for His grace. He takes care of us in all circumstances. As the sign in our sanctuary says, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Hebrews 13:8)."

It was during his internship, when he treated a small child who was seriously ill. He and his colleague sat through the whole night trying ever so many remedies, but the child did not recover and two days later died. It was the first death of a patient under his care, and he was devastated and wept. That is when he turned to the Lord. A doctor can only do so much, but life and death are in God's hands. This made him to turn to the Scriptures and to God for help in the treatment of each one of his patients. His favourite words are from the hymn "Let all mortal flesh keep silence and in fear trembling stand".

He was instrumental in the construction of 151 houses for tsunami affected fishermen in Cuddalore district, where he was appreciated by the then Governor of Tamil Nadu, Mr Surjeeth Singh Barnala for his efforts. He also shared the dais with former US President Jimmy Carter in Villupuram district, during his association with the Carter Foundation. In addition, he facilitated the construction of 100 houses for leprosy patients in Vadathorasalur, Tamil Nadu.

He loved to spend time with children recounting his experiences in medicine. He spared no effort to make their stay welcome and enjoyable. A room in in our house was allotted to be filled with all the summer fruits, like different varieties of mangoes, ice apples, coconuts, bananas.

He would make the evening prayer time interesting by explaining the meaning of the different passages from the Bible. Delving deep into their historical background and various interpretations of the word.

Dr Robins Theodore was also a brilliant sports person. His achievements as a captain of the University team in cricket won him many laurels. He was a fine batsman and badminton player too.



Above all, he had a healing touch.

Just a month before his passing, he was treating an 85-year-old lady whom the other doctors had given up on and healed her completely, without surgery and just medication. He was a voracious reader and could speak eloquently on any subject and was very knowledgeable. We loved to listen to his discussions and arguments, especially regarding Biblical understanding.

By his untimely demise we lost a wonderful person who was loving, caring and always full of fun and laughter. Everything this man was and what he meant to us cannot be put in words. His son-in-law Mr Rajesh was throughout with Dr Robins when he was in the hospital. This shows he was an adorable person.

Today we celebrate the life of Dr Robins Theodore who has touched and healed the lives of many. We praise and thank God for the good life he has led.

Their daughter Mrs Sharon Varsha was part of their journey throughout. Dr Robins and Radha worked together from 1977 to 2010 after which they moved to their hometown, Hyderabad. She continues to work as a consultant for TLM Ireland.

Report - Men's Fellowship

(April - June 2021)

The Men's Fellowship of our church resumed its meetings in virtual mode immediately after the Lent break. I took over as convenor of the Fellowship from my predecessor Dr Joel Bunyan, who placed the Fellowship on sound footing with missionary zeal under the guidance of our dear Pastor Rev K J Cecil Victor. The Pastor continues to play a pivotal role in the Fellowship.

During the period under report, the second wave of COVID-19 was at its peak and all the activities of our church were greatly impacted by the same and the Men's Fellowship was no exception. The Zoom app was a powerful window that the Lord provided to facilitate meetings and conferences during the trying and troubled times of the COVID-19 pandemic. Although this was a time when the Fellowship could've done something beautiful for God by providing some real help to the affected, it could not do anything in the absence of any resources and the task was also daunting, fraught with grave risks and many practical difficulties. Some of the fellowship members, however, did respond to the need in their own humble and individual ways. It is a matter of deep regret that the fellowship collectively could not do anything. We need to ponder over and reflect on this so that the fellowship is in a better position to do something tangible next time.

Fellowship Meetings

The Men's Fellowship met virtually through the Zoom app every Tuesday from 7 pm onwards for about 75–90 minutes. In every meeting, we enjoyed praising and worshipping the Lord with hymns, scripture reading, devotions, listening to the message of God, intercessory prayers and towards the end participating in the Bible quiz. Each meeting always concluded with a closing prayer and benediction by our Pastor.

All the messages were delivered by learned men of God with rich pastoral experience and sometimes by our own senior members in the fellowship with proven accomplishments. All the messages were marked by their clarity, brevity and providing of deep insights into the Scriptures leading the members to self-examination and introspection. The messages were heard with great interest and attention. Nearly half the messages were delivered by our dear Pastor Rev K J Cecil Victor and the rest by Rt Rev P Surya Prakash (Emeritus Bishop, CSI Karimnagar), Dr Samson Gandhi, Dr M Anthony David, and Bro Jason Wilson. Rev Gabriel (CSI, Mangalore), and Rev Silvan C Kumar (CSI, Bangalore) also shared the word of God. On one occasion we also heard a recorded sermon of Rt Rev Daniel Thyagaraja, Bishop of Jaffna Diocese, CSI (Sri Lanka) of who spoke about the first calling of the disciples (Philip and Nathaniel) by Jesus Christ. All the members were greatly benefited by these sermons. The threshold level of the scriptural knowledge of all our Fellowship members is quite high.



Bible Quiz

Towards the end of each meeting, all the participants were divided into 3–4 groups of 4 each for the purpose of conducting the Bible quiz for about 20 minutes. About 24 questions were set from 4 or 5 chapters of the Gospel (mostly involving simple direct answers) and the quizmaster asked these questions, one at a time, to each team by rotation. The last few questions were open to all teams simultaneously, and whichever team answered first, got the credits. All the members came prepared for the quiz, which made it quite competitive and interesting. We have so far completed the Gospel of St Matthew and the Gospel of St Mark is about to be completed. The main purpose of the quiz is to make all the members read the Scriptures and thereby refresh their knowledge, remember and follow the word of God, thus coming closer to Him, and bear fruit for Him.

Miscellaneous Activities

Some members of our fellowship play active roles in the smooth conduct of church services (including online) and help the pastor in the organisational matters of the church. The WhatsApp group of our Fellowship is always active and effective mode of communication with several members posting material on a daily basis —melodious Christian hymns, daily meditations/devotions, scripture lessons, historical facts about scriptures and Saints, news of relevance to all Christians, interesting anecdotes, Covid-19 related developments, and several others.

Future Outlook



We managed to retain humour in our lives, and had two beautiful children, Rohini and Sandeep.

People may think I am biased, when I say that my daughter was the kindest, most beautiful person both inside and out. To me she was incomparable. My son was kind, generous, and someone I loved more than life itself. My life after 2005, when I lost my son in an accident has been tumultuous.

I was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2008, and if it was not for my daughter, my husband and my siblings, I would not have gotten through it. The tragedies in my life did not end. I lost my daughter in 2009. I knew that my too husband was living on borrowed time, God's pure grace and his own determination kept him alive, because he knew he had to be there with me, but God wanted him more.

My husband was taken from me a year later. God realised that I had grown stronger, I had been cured of cancer. I had my siblings, my church, some friends and mainly God on my side. With God's help I live every day with joy in my heart and a song on my lips.

I have so much to be grateful for because God is my refuge and strength. A very present help in trouble. Therefore, I will not fear, though the earth be removed, though the mountain be carried into the midst of the sea. Psalm 46: 1-2.

Doing the Impossible with God

A career in the US, which I didn't even choose in the beginning, was the very path God made me pursue. And God gave me an amazing opportunity to shadow in a top hospital in the USA, Mayo Clinic. God has been part of every detail of my application, interviews, visa, and the whole process of selection. I am blessed with a loving family, including my grandparents, who have played an enormous role in my life.

All I can say is God is good, and His grace is powerful. For God speaks, "You will succeed, not by military might or by your strength, but by my spirit. 






Chronography of Fr Stan Swamy



Fr Stanislaus Lourduswamy

Fr Stanislaus Lourduswamy, fondly known as Swamy was born on 26 April 1937 in Trichy, <u>Tamil Nadu</u>, India. In the 1970s, he studied theology and received a master's degree in sociology in the Philippines, where he encountered a series of protests and demonstrations against the administration. During his further studies, he made friends with Brazilian Catholic Archbishop Hélder Câmara, whose work with poor people influenced him.

Stanislaus Lourduswamy (26 April 1937 – 5 July 2021), popularly known as Stan Swamy, was an Indian Roman Catholic priest, a member of the Jesuit order, and a tribal rights activist for several decades. Swamy was the oldest person to be accused of terrorism in India.

Activism

Fr Swamy was the director of the Jesuit-run Indian Social Institute, Bangalore, from 1975 to 1986. He had questioned the non-implementation of the Fifth Schedule of the Constitution, which stipulates setting up of a Tribes Advisory Council with members solely of the Adivasi community for their protection, well-being and development in the state.

In a video circulated two days ahead of his arrest, Swamy suggested his arrest was linked to his work, as it involved dissent against government policies.

He said, what is happening to me is not something unique happening to me alone. It is a broader process that is taking place all over the country. We are all aware how prominent intellectuals, lawyers writers, poets, activists, students, leaders, they are all put into jail because they have expressed their dissent or raised questions about the ruling powers of India. We are part of the process. In a way I am happy to be part of this process. I am not a silent spectator, but part of the game, and ready to pay the price whatever be it.

While incarcerated in Taloja Central Jail, in a letter to his Jesuit colleague, Fr Swamy highlighted the plight of the prisoners stating, "Many of such poor under trials don't know what charges have been put on them, have not seen their charge sheet and just remain in prison for years without any legal or other assistance."

Fr Swamy was implicated in the 2018 Bhima Koregaon violence, while he claimed that he was not in Pune during the said period, and he was accused of being a Maoist "sympathiser". It was alleged that the Persecuted Prisoners Solidarity Committee (PPSC) founded by him and Sudha Bharadwaj, "to fight for the release of around 3,000 men and women who have been labelled as Maoists and imprisoned", was a front for Maoist fundraising. The Jesuits denied the allegation of Swamy being a Maoist, by stating that it was against the ethos of the Jesuit order. He was arrested by the NIA on 8 October 2020, from Bagaicha, a Jesuit social action centre, [17] and charged under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967, under which bail can be denied.

Fr Swamy's arrest triggered widespread protests across India. The arrests were termed as politically motivated due to his work among the Adivasi community, the release of under trials, Persecuted Prisoners Solidarity




Committee, among others. Leaders of other minority religions also protested his arrest. In a protest on 21 October 2020, leaders of opposition political parties such as Shashi Tharoor, Sitaram Yechury, D. Raja, Supriya Sule and Kanimozhi along with economist Jean Dreze, Dr Joseph Marianus Kujur, the director of the Ranchi-based Xavier Institute of Social Sciences, activists Dayamani Barla and Rupali Jadhav, and lawyer Mihir Desai called for Fr Stan's release.

Jharkhand Chief Minister Shri. Hemant Sorn and Kerala Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan objected to the arrest of Father Swawy. Fr Swamy suffered from Parkinson's disease and other age-related illnesses. He fell multiple times while in prison. He suffered from hearing loss in both ears and had undergone surgeries. While appearing before the Court over video conferencing on 21 May 2021, Swamy refused to be admitted to either JJ hospital or any other hospital and requested only interim bail so that he could go to his home in Ranchi, citing his rapidly deteriorating health. On 28 May 2021, the Bombay High Court directed the Maharashtra government to admit Swamy to a private hospital for 15 days, considering his rapidly deteriorating health. He was admitted to the Holy Family Hospital, Mumbai. Fr.Swamy then tested positive for COVID-19.

On 4 July 2021, Swamy was put on ventilator support, as his health deteriorated. He died on 5 July 2021, ahead of his bail hearing in Bombay High Court.
